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# Tips to help master your wedding guest list

Weddings are such momentous occasions that it's no wonder couples want to share their big days with as many people as possible. Though a wedding where all friends, family members and acquaintances are in attendance may be a dream scenario, reality often calls for a more carefully curated guest

Data from The Wedding Report indicates that the average cost of a wedding is slightly more than \$20,000, though that figure could be substantially higher, or even lower, depending on where couples tie the knot. Both The Wedding Report and The Knot report that a wedding venue and catering make up a significant percentage of the overall cost of a wedding, with some figures indicating that these expenses account for around 65 percent of the final price tag. The number of guests couples will host on their wedding day will affect which venue they book and how much food and beverages they'll need to satisfy guests. Couples who hope to stay within budget can consider these tips as they try to build a guest list that won't break the bank.

· Accept input. Parents may no longer foot the entire bill for their children's weddings, but couples who are accepting some financial help from parents must also accept Mom's and Dad's input regarding the guest list. Even if parents' desired guests do not ultimately make the cut, it's best to respect their wishes

and consider who they want to invite. Couples who are financing their own weddings without outside help need not feel beholden to invite anyone who does not meet their invitation criteria.

· Make a preliminary list without regard to budget. Couples can have fun making preliminary guest lists without considering their budgets. A preliminary list can serve as a solid starting point, and couples may even realize that their list is within budget. Once the preliminary lists have been created, couples can categorize guests (i.e., distant cousins, coworkers, etc.) and then work together to determine if any categories can be eliminated from the invitation list. For example, couples who may be going over budget with their guest lists can each agree to remove distant cousins from their prospective invitees.

- · Seek advice. Many couples face difficult decisions regarding their wedding day guest lists, so it can be helpful to speak to a recently married friend or relative to see how they handled paring down their guest lists. Some might have done it by category, while others might have limited guest lists to local friends and family. When taking this approach, couples can speak to friends about how they approached handling people who were surprised that they were not on the final list of invitees.
- Throw a less formal party down the road. A less expensive backyard barbecue

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

# How to build a wedding budget without breaking the bank

Wedding planning is a unique experience unlike any endeavor most couples will ever encounter. Much effort goes into planning a wedding, and that includes building a budget that ensures the big day will be fun without breaking the bank.

Most couples planning a wedding have never tied the knot before, so it can be difficult to determine a reasonable amount to spend. It's easy to go overboard when planning a wedding, and couples may find their list of wants and, consequently, their expenses, growing as they get into the weeds of wedding planning. Though it might require some difficult decisions, couples can keep these tips in mind so they can build a wedding budget that won't land them in debt after saying, "I do."

- · Determine funding. The days when a bride's parents would finance the wedding entirely on their own are largely a thing of the past. According to a recent Wedding-Wire Newlywed Report, parents now pay for 52 percent of wedding expenses. As couples begin establishing a wedding budget, it's imperative that they first determine who, if anyone, will be helping them finance the big day. Fifty-two percent of wedding expenses is a significant amount of money, but in that scenario, couples will still need to come up with roughly half of the money needed to fund their weddings. Couples without substantial savings may be forced to cut back in order to avoid beginning their life as a married couple in debt.
- Make a list of potential expenses. Location will be a significant factor when determining potential expenses. For example, a 2022 ValuePenguin analysis of data from The Wedding Report found that the average wedding in Massachusetts cost roughly \$30,500 in 2020,

while couples tying the knot in Arkansas spent around \$12,500 on their weddings. With such wild fluctuations, it's important that couples get an accurate estimate of how much it may cost them to get married in a given city. Couples who met in a city and still live in a city but grew up in a suburb might save a considerable sum by getting married in their hometowns. Compare and contrast prices in locales you're considering, and then build your budget accordingly. This can help you avoid sticker shock and going over budget. Notable expenses to budget include the venue, attire (i.e., wedding dress and tuxedo rental), hairstyle and makeup, entertainment, photography, and transportation, among others.

• Make a list of what's most important. Most couples will have to compromise in order to avoid taking on debt to finance their weddings. An earnest discussion about what's most important to each person can ensure you both get what you want. Each person can make a list of their priorities, ranking them from most important to least important. Once lists are shared, couples can see where their priorities



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converge and where they diverge. Any items that rank low on each person's list of priorities can be afforded less funding, while those that are high on each list can take up more of the budget, if necessary.

• Commit to a limit before spending a dime. Committing to a limit before spending a dime can help couples keep wedding costs more manageable. Once that number is defined, couples can then work within its parameters, which can make potentially difficult decisions a little easier by narrowing options at a time when options can seem endless.

Here are some great 'non-traditional' appetizers that would be a tasty, unique treat for your bridal shower!

#### Crab Wonton Cups

32 wonton wrappers Cooking spray

8 oz cream cheese, softened

1/2 cup heavy whipping cream

1 large egg, room temperature

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

5 drops hot pepper sauce

1 cup lump crabmeat, drained

1/4 cup thinly sliced green onions 1/4 cup finely chopped sweet red

pepper 1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

### Minced chives, optional **Instructions**

Preheat oven to 350°. Press wonton wrappers into miniature muffin cups coated with cooking spray. Spritz wrappers with cooking spray. Bake until lightly browned, 8-9 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, beat cream cheese, cream, egg, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and pepper sauce until smooth. Stir in crab, green onions and red pepper; spoon into wonton cups. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

Bake until filling is heated through, 10-12 minutes. Serve warm. If desired, garnish with minced chives. Refrigerate leftovers.

### Quick Focaccia Bread

1 loaf (1 pound) frozen bread dough, thawed

1/2 cup sliced pimientostuffed olives

1/2 cup shredded Colby-Monterey Jack cheese

1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese

1 teaspoon Italian seasoning 2 tablespoons olive oil

Instructions







On an ungreased baking sheet, pat dough into a 12x6-in. rectangle. Build up edges slightly. Top with olives, cheeses and Italian seasoning; press gently into dough. Drizzle with oil.

Bake at 350° until cheese is melted and golden brown, 15-20 minutes. Let stand for 5 minutes before slicing.

#### Cream Cheese Dainties

1 cup butter, softened

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

2-1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 cup apricot spreadable fruit or seedless raspberry preserves

#### **Instructions**

In a large bowl, cream butter and cream cheese until light and fluffy. Gradually add flour to the creamed mixture and mix well. Divide dough into 4 portions; cover and refrigerate until easy to handle.

On a lightly floured surface, roll 1 portion of dough at a time into a 10x7-1/2-in. rectangle. Trim edges if necessary. Cut into 2-1/2-in. squares.

Place 1/4 teaspoon spreadable fruit or preserves near each end of 2 diagonal corners. Moisten the remaining 2 corners with water; fold over and press lightly.

Place on ungreased baking sheets. Bake at  $350^{\circ}$  until corners are lightly browned, 12-15 minutes. Cool 2-3 minutes before removing to wire racks to cool.

First Reformed Church of Edgerton Modern weddings can be a spectacle for the senses. Sights, sounds, tastes, and smells all come into play as we celebrate two people coming together in the marriage covenant. Months and often years go into the planning of these events. In all the celebration occurring on a wedding day, amidst the joy and festivities, lies the heart of what is taking place: the sacred covenant of marriage. This solemn commitment, made before God and witnesses, embodies more than the visible union; it is a profound testimony of love and dedication that profoundly reminds us of God's love for us.

As we consider this love and the sacred bond of marriage, I want us to dwell on Song of Solomon 8:6-7.

Set me as a seal upon your heart, as a seal upon your arm, for love is strong as death, jealousy is fierce as the grave. Its flashes are flashes of fire, the very flame of the Lord. Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it. If a man offered for love all the wealth of his house, he would be utterly despised.

This passage paints a vivid picture of love's fierce, encompassing nature. It is not merely an emotion but a powerful force that binds and protects, as enduring and unyielding as death itself. The imagery of love as a seal upon the arm symbolizes its strength and the protection it offers within the covenant of marriage. This love, likened to the fire of the LORD, is inextinguishable, highlighting the depth and resilience of the bond formed in the covenant of marriage.

Interestingly, the passage also touches on the value of love, suggesting that it cannot be acquired with wealth; its worth is immeasurable, a priceless gift from God. Such is the love pledged to one another in the coming together of a man and woman in the covenant of marriage. It is truly a treasure beyond compare, reflecting the divine love that God has bestowed upon his people.

Yet, Song of Solomon's portrayal of romantic love also serves a higher purpose, pointing us toward the ultimate expression of love in Jesus Christ's life, death, resurrection, and ascension. Marriage, in its essence, mirrors the sacrificial love and unbreakable bond between Christ and the Church. It is a reminder that true love within marriage transcends fleeting emotions, rooted instead in the sacrificial love demonstrated by Christ. This godly love endures through every season, sustained not by mere feelings but by the profound commitment to selflessly love and cherish one another as Christ loves the Church.

As anyone who has been married for any period of time knows, the path of marriage is not without challenges. No union is perfect; it joins two imperfect beings, each needing grace. In these moments of imperfection and difficulty, the true essence of your covenant is tested

and strengthened. Drawing from the well of God's sacrificial love for us, married couples are called to be patient, forgiving, and enduring.


When faced with trials, this sacrificial, unwavering love will endure. This kind of love can weather any storm, and it finds its model in the cross of Christ. Here, in the shadow of the cross, we see the strength to love unconditionally, forgive generously, and hold fast to our cov-

In these situations, embrace grace, forgive, and prioritize the spouse's well-being above your own. Let the gospel's transforming power be the bedrock of your marriage, guiding you to love not just in word but in action and truth.

In conclusion, the marriage covenant reminds us of God's unquenchable love for his covenant people. His love refuses to let go. His love forgives, heals, and restores. By modeling our relationships on this divine love, we build a foundation for marriage and love that is a witness to the immeasurable grace shown to us in the Lord Jesus Christ.


